There is never a dull year for Cantare! But what a year, full of successes, pleasant surprises and visible impact in the lives of so many Oakland students! Financially, we have had another good year, despite substantial additional expenses as we expanded our programming and had our first full year for a while with an Executive Director. 

Mary Finch began her service as Cantare's Executive Director in November 2021, as the pandemic was beginning to ease and school offerings and choir rehearsals were returning to being face to face, but still with masks required. She quickly made her presence felt through her leadership with staff and in building relationships with Cantare donors. Mary concluded her time with Cantare at the end of our FY2023, in order to give herself time to manage her shifting personal responsibilities. In her brief 20-month tenure, Mary greatly expanded our public footprint in the Bay Area, increased funding income from individuals and foundations, participated in strengthening our Board, and provided programmatic support for David, Julie and Conway in our Adult and our Children's & Youth offerings. Cantare's staff, board and supporters are sincerely appreciative of Mary's accomplishments, delivered with her marvelous professional and compassionate touch.

Our 2022-23 season featured the Chorale, Chamber Ensemble and Summer Adult Choir performing six highly diverse concerts. Our summer choir concert featured selections from Broadway musicals spanning nine decades. Our Chamber Ensemble offered sell-out performances of fabulous choral arrangements of The Beatles songs. The Chorale and Ensemble along with Nova and Youth Honor Choir presented their spectacular annual December Holiday Concert, which is the finest of its kind in the Bay Area. In March, the Chorale and Ensemble performed a concert of Jewish music featuring Ernest Bloch's Sacred Service at Oakland's Scottish Rite Center. These same adult choirs collaborated with Nova, Youth Honor Choir, our Lincoln Elementary School Music Stars and the Great Wall Youth Orchestra in offering choral arrangements of songs from Asia's Pacific Rim countries. With Bay Area renowned Wendy Tokuda as our Emcee, this concert raised historical and cultural awareness, increasing appreciation for those representing these various cultures that share prominence in our local community and nation. It was a moving afternoon of music-making and personal storytelling.

We continued to walk alongside one another through the changes that transpired in the lives of our singers, their families and friends. Once again, we affirmed the value of Cantare's mission, nurturing a compassionate community across boundaries that often divide us, through the beauty and power of choral music.

What a privilege for me to be a part of this lofty endeavor.

A Reflection of the Asia's Pacific Rim Concert

Our country is experiencing so much violence and hatred. We are polarized and traumatized by what we see all around us. Is healing even possible? Healing from watching our country violate human rights of immigrants and transgender people, from hateful crimes against Asian people, or micro-traumas from daily interactions with those unaware of their privilege.

This is where Cantare fills that gap. Music plays a role in helping communities heal by creating connections between people of all generations. We may never have full cultural understanding of the people around us, but on May 21, 2023, Cantare was determined to try.

The evening's program listed traditional songs from eight different Asian countries. I assumed they'd be sung in English. I wondered if it would have the same meaning after translation. I then learned both the adult and children's choirs would be singing them in their original language. I was cynical—and impressed at the same time. I thought, "So many people can't even pronounce "Phờ " properly when ordering at a Vietnamese restaurant (pronounced "phuh"), and now they would sing it?"

That evening, the audience was amazed. Faces lit up when they heard their own language belted out with pride. The crowd was awestruck by each language perfectly sung in harmony. Connections were made that evening in a polarized society where our traumas have distanced us from one another.

If music is an antidote to life's traumas, Cantare, thoughtfully and intentionally, provided it in the way the audience could receive it...in their own language.

Lifting Voices Uplifting Lives



Last year, we stepped up to meet the exciting demand in our community for our after-school choir programs. Our longtime choirs at Lincoln Elementary and Melrose Leadership Academy reached record enrollment rates and Nova nearly doubled in size. We also started three new tuition-free choirs at Cleveland, Franklin and La Escuelita Elementary schools.

Our youth choirs united in November for our Pride and Joy Festival. Coming out of pandemic conditions, it was the first opportunity for many of our students to perform. The feeling of community and connection was palpable. Our spring concert in May, *Shining through the City*, celebrated music from Oakland's AAPI community. Students and parents helped our choirs

learn songs in eight languages.

In March, our Nova singers toured to Southern California. We learned so much at a clinic with the Cal Poly Pomona choir director and enjoyed touring the campus. At the Anaheim Heritage Music Festival, Nova received the prestigious Gold Award and senior Nai Trawick was awarded Most Outstanding Soloist. The adjudicators noted the artistry our students demonstrated while singing repertoire from Malaysia, Japan and Iraq. We celebrated our achievements in Disneyland!

As part of our professional voice coaching program, Nova students also shared their individual artistic achievements. They courageously performed an incredibly diverse recital of solos, duets and trios with selections from musical theater to hip hop to a Mexican folk ballad.

Each week, I am proud to see incredible growth in our after-school choir singers as they develop their voices and grow as musicians, leaders and team members.

learning experiences, and creating lifelong relationships with local communities.

We expanded our offerings of the interdisciplinary programs to 30 classrooms at four sites: Lincoln, La Escuelita, Laurel, and Piedmont Avenue Elementary Schools. We culminated each residency with a performance, celebrating history-makers and leaders who used their voices to make a difference.

We partnered with Arwen Lawrence and Jorge Liceaga (see video) from Cascada de Flores to bring an all-new Spanish Music Class to TK-2nd grade students and their parents at La Escuelita. This program began in response to a request from a principal, who communicated newcomer families' hesitance to come on school campus or to interact with school staff. Through songs and games in their native language, we saw parents strengthen their connections with their children, other newcomer families, school staff and the resources provided on-site. This eight-week program served as a pilot program for other language based programs next year (Mandarin at Franklin and Lincoln Elementary).



We understand strong partnerships are rooted in communication and collaborative spirits. Our strong partnership with our schools helped us navigate the OUSD teachers' strike in May 2023. With collaborative efforts from and with our partners, we were able to have another successful year for our students.

Summer Music Camp

Our summer music camp was a highenergy two weeks of singing, community and creativity. One hundred rising 4-9th graders from across Oakland came together, forming new friendships, and challenging themselves musically. After just three days, our 100 campers learned ar arrangement of the National Anthem with American Sign Language to perform at an Oakland Athletics game. In the other eight days, they prepared an entire program



with singing, choreography, xylophone accompaniment and speaking roles, of songs that celebrated our theme of individuality, love and acceptance: "This is Me." Many campers rose to the opportunity to perform their first solo.

Campers were supported by an incredible team of 10 counselors, grades 10-12. These young adults gave each student the support and encouragement they needed to thrive. Counselors developed their leadership skills while gaining paid work experience.

Community Outreach






Our staff and community partners are also sharing their voices to make a difference. The discussion offered an overview of Cantare's unique partnership with the Oakland Unified School District and strategies for effectively partnering with a school and the community. We are thankful to our panelists for sharing their time and insight: Mukta Sambrani, Lincoln Elementary Principal; Fillmore Rydeen, Director of OUSD Visual and Performing Arts Department; Valerina Hilton, Kindergarten teacher at La Escuelita and choir parent; Mercedes Harrison, Cantare Board Member and Education and Outreach chairperson.

Cantare closed the 2022-23 fiscal year with a 4.6% deficit combined with a significant 13.3% advancement in support of our children's and youth programs in FY24. Government funding included grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, California Arts Council, California Small Businesses Administration and Alameda County, of which \$87,500 accounted for the remainder of our pandemic relief dollars. Cantare added two new foundation supporters who when coupled with increased support from past funders boosted foundation contributions by 42% to nearly \$180,000. Our individual donor contributions also dramatically

increased. The generosity and continued support

Treasurer's Report

Cantare is fortunate to have dedicated and committed staff. We believe that providing a living wage to our employees not only is fair, but it helps to retain quality, talented, mission-motivated personnel.

Cash flow for the fiscal year relied on funds from the previous year to advance us into a new season in which we reap the benefit of accrued funding. The Wong Fund, which supports supplemental Children's programs, is above \$50,000, which we anticipate drawing down over the next several years per the restrictions set forth in the gift. This year it helped to underwrite our youth summer camp attended by 100 students.

Through the generosity of donors, funders and government support, Cantare is poised to move forward with significant growth in our children's programs and expansion in the community through our adult choirs.
